What you know: Our church hosted Families Flourish moms and children twice; you've heard of the fun had by volunteers from First Presbyterian and our friends from Families Flourish.

You may also know that

- Families Flourish has achieved success with about 48 local families whom they've moved to neighborhoods with sidewalks, streetlights, parks, schools and libraries within walking distance, and absence of gunfire and threats.
- And that each family has a coach to help them navigate tasks we take for granted, such as how to 1) deal with a bank, 2) do a parent conference, 3) write a resume and apply for a job, 4) parent a child, and many more tasks that are very familiar to most of us.

What you may not know:

Families Flourish parents

- experience an impressive income increase
- see a large decrease in emergency room costs
- develop a greater sense of security
- have improved credit scores
- experience great reduction of stress

Families Flourish children

- develop a greater interest in school
- achieve better grades
- make more friends
- have better health

What our church is doing: Families Flourish is supported financially by many organizations and businesses. Our Session voted at the August meeting to assist Families Flourish with a one-time gift of \$19,200. This money comes from special funds dedicated to mission projects. 2024 Scholarships Awarded

Three college students from First Presbyterian are beginning their fall semesters with a bit of extra help this year, thanks to the church scholarship program. Jack Bates, Brayden King, and Cole Wright each received \$2,500 from the scholarship funds. Additionally, we donated \$1,000 to the Otterbein Nursing School from the Barbara Haffenden Memorial Scholarship.

Coming Soon: Our Annual CROP Walk Sunday, October 13

We hope you will support this year's CROP Walk in whatever way works for you. You have four options: walk on 10/13 (choice of 2 locations; see below), support an individual who is walking, support all our walkers, or walk on another day by yourself.

You also have two choices for a walk. (1) The short Westerville/Northside walk will begin at 2 pm, meeting at the shelter house at Hoff Woods Park (off McCorkle Blvd. across the street from Westerville's main post office). (2) The downtown walk will begin at Scioto Audubon Metro Park (400 W Whittier St, near Olentangy River and near where Red, White and Boom fireworks happen). An Impact Fair at 1 pm will offer more about WARM, as well as other local agencies. You can also enjoy great learning activities for families, a photo booth, etc. The longer Walk Send-Off is at 2 pm. With picnic pavilions nearby, you can bring lunch and make a day of it.

Whether you walk or not, a financial donation to CROP would be very helpful. Make checks payable to First Presbyterian Church of Westerville and **indicate CROP on the check**.

CROP continues to fight against the challenges of disease, disaster, displacement, war, famine, and other concerns that leave people hungry. Join with us as we raise funds to help neighbors near and far get the meals they need today and sustainable food security assistance for developing their own future food sources. About 25% of the money raised by Westerville churches stays locally with WARM to further its community mission in the Westerville area. Be sure to ask your friends to support you in your walk. The more money we raise, the more poor and hungry people we can help. Our congregation has participated in every CROP Walk since 1985 (36 years), and we usually raise the most money of any participating Westerville church, between \$3000 and \$4000 each year. Nationally, CROP walks raise many millions of dollars annually.

We walk to remember and help those worldwide who walk daily to meet their basic food and water needs. We walk to end hunger one person at a time, and we hope you can support us on October 13.



Pastor's Page Rev. Nancy Dumford New FPCW Connections Team

We are in the process of gathering a group of people to form a Connections Team that will develop a strategy to genuinely greet and support visitors from their first visit until they are engaged and ready to join our church. We've had wonderful discussions of how to approach this important ministry. To better understand our purpose, consider this excerpt from Nelson Searcy's book, *Fusion:*

Next Sunday the Spirit of God will prompt hundreds of thousands of people in the US and millions around the world to visit a church for the first time. The Sunday after that, He will do it again... The question is: Are you and I doing all we can to accept and honor His blessing?¹

I love this beginning. Nelson Searcy, the author, reminds us that our church is really God's church, and He blesses us by bringing people to our door in a multitude of ways. We see them as "guests," but really, they are gifts from God. What we do with these precious gifts says much about our appreciation for their arrival. Have you ever gotten a gift and set it off to the side, without a thank-you note or a thought to its use? When we fail to receive a gift well, it reflects on our heart's condition. Searcy reminded me that each person takes an incredible risk when they visit a church. For many, it becomes a ripe opportunity for them to begin or re-engage their journey of faith. We want them with us, not so that our church can grow, but so that their lives can be touched, enriched, and transformed by the Lord. The work we do is holy work, and we do not do it alone. God partners with us to welcome the people He has drawn to us.

To work toward this goal, we have two events planned for this fall:

- First, a welcome reception called *Meet First Pres* to be held in the library after worship on Sunday, September 29. If you are new or newer to First Presbyterian, we hope you will join us for lunch and a chance to learn a little bit more about our church.
- Second, a **membership class** to be held in Fellowship Hall after worship on Sunday, November 3. If you would like to explore what it means to become a member of First Presbyterian Church, join us for lunch and a two-hour class. Taking the class does not obligate you to join the church, but it will give you a deeper understanding of our local and denominational expression, and the historic church of Jesus Christ. Thank you to all who offer themselves as "ambassadors"² for Christ, both within our building and in the broader community.
